Before use

Read this before attempting any operations.

As the unit may become warm during operation, always leave sufficient space around the unit for ventilation.

Make sure there is at least 20 cm of space above and at least 5 cm of space on each side of the unit. Do NOT place anything on top of the unit.

The voltage supplied to the unit should match the voltage as printed on the rear panel. If you are in any doubt regarding this matter, consult an electrician.

Choose the installation location of your unit carefully. Avoid placing it in direct sunlight or close to a source of heat. Also avoid locations subject to vibrations and excessive dust, heat, cold or moisture.

Do not place the unit on an amplifier/receiver.

Do not open the cabinet as this might result in damage to the circuitry or electrical shock. If a foreign object should get into the unit, contact your dealer or service company.

When removing the power plug from the wall outlet, always pull directly on the plug, never yank the cord.



A LINE IN/OUT jacks

These jacks transmit an analog 2-channel audio signal. Connect the components using RCA cables.

Make sure to connect the cables as follows: white plug white jack (L: left channel) red plug red jack (R: right channel)



Be sure to insert each plug securely. To prevent hum and noise, avoid bundling the cables together with the AC power cord or speaker cables.

B PHONO jacks

Connect the turntable's RCA pin cord to the PHONO jacks.

Make sure to connect the cables as follows: white plug white jack (L: left channel) red plug red jack (R: right channel)

Be sure to insert each plug securely. To prevent hum and noise, avoid bundling the cables together with the AC power cord or speaker cables.

C SIGNAL GND

To prevent hum and noise, connect the ground lead of the turntable to this terminal.



Compatible iPod Software

If your iPod does not work with the unit or with the remote control unit, software update may solve the problem. Visit the Apple web site and download the latest iPod Software.

F VIDEO OUT terminal

This terminal outputs video signal from iPod. Use a composite video cable to connect the dock to the composite video connector of a television or monitor.

G S-VIDEO OUT terminal


This terminal outputs S-video signal from iPod. Use an S-video cable to connect the dock to the S-video input of a suitably equipped television or monitor. Use this connection in preference to a composite video connection.







If you have TEAC compact disc player PD-H600, convenient system control functions are possible.



By pressing the STANDBY/ON button on the remote control unit (RC-1181) of AG-H600 series receiver, you can switch on/standby both AG-H600 and PD-H600. You cannot switch on/standby PD-H600 using the remote control unit (RC-1182) of PD-H600.

When you change the source on the AG-H600 series receiver from CD to another, playback stops on PD-H600.

When you want to use the system control functions, connect the SYSTEM CONTROL jack of each component by a system control connection cord (supplied with PD-H600), and set the SYSTEM CONTROL SELECTOR switch on the rear panel of the PD-H600 to "SYSTEM".

Remote Control Unit

You can operate the unit using the remote control unit RC-1181 supplied with it.

When operating the remote control unit, point it towards the remote sensor on the front panel of the unit.

Remote control operation may be impossible if there are any obstacles between the unit and the remote control.

If the remote control unit is operated near other appliances which generate infrared rays, or if other remote control devices using infrared rays are used near the unit, it may operate incorrectly. And conversely, the other appliances may operate incorrectly.

Caution

Check the impedance of your speakers. Connect speaker with an impedance of between 4 ohms and 8 ohms.

The red speaker terminals are (positive) and the black speaker terminals are (negative).

Generally, the side of the speaker cable is marked to make it distinguishable from the side of the cable. Connect the marked side to the terminal and the unmarked side to the black terminal.

The metal portions of the two separate wires should not touch or an electrical short can occur. Shorted wires can create a fire hazard or induce a failure in your equipment.

Be sure to insert each plug securely. To prevent hum and noise, avoid bundling the cables together with the AC power cord or other cables.

How to connect:


- 1. Turn the terminal cap counterclockwise to loosen it. The speaker terminal caps cannot be fully removed from the base.
- 2. Insert the wire into the terminal and turn the terminal cap clockwise to securely connect it:

Make sure none of the wire insulation is under the terminal and only the bare, stripped wire is touching the terminal.

3. Make sure the cable is fastened firmly by pulling the cable lightly.

Battery Installation

1. Remove the battery compartment cover.



- 2. Insert two "AAA" (R03, UM-4) dry batteries. Make sure that the batteries are inserted with their positive " " and negative " " poles positioned correctly.
- 3. Close the cover.

Battery Replacement

If the effective range decreases, the batteries are exhausted. In this case replace the batteries with new ones.

Precautions concerning batteries

Be sure to insert the batteries with correct positive " $\,\,$ " and negative " $\,\,$ " polarities.


Use batteries of the same type. Never use different types of batteries together.

Rechargeable and non-rechargeable batteries can be used. Refer to the precautions on their labels.


When the remote control unit is not to be used for a long time (more than a month), remove the batteries from the battery compartment to prevent them from leaking. If they leak, wipe away the liquid inside the battery compartment and replace the batteries with new ones.

Do not heat or disassemble batteries and never dispose of old batteries by throwing them in a fire.

Parts Identification







a STANDBY/ON

Press this button to turn the unit on or standby.

b TUNER, CD, iPod, AUX, PHONO

Use these buttons to select a source.

c BAND

Use this button to select FM, AM, DAB or Internet Radio.

d TUNING/PRESET (√/∧)

Use these buttons to tune in FM/AM stations.

e TUNING MODE/AUTO TUNING

While listening to FM/AM/DAB, use this button to change the tuning mode.

f MEMORY SCAN

9 FM MODE

While listening to FM, use this button to select stereo or monaural.

h REPEAT

Use this button to change the repeat mode of PD-H600 or iPod.

i Stop()

Use this button to stop playback of PD-H600 or iPod.



Basic Operation



1 Press the power switch to turn the unit on.

The standby indicator lights blue.

When the system control functions are activated, always set this switch on, and turn the unit on/standby using the remote control unit.

2 Select a source.

Each time you press the SOURCE button, the source changes as follows:

CD

iPod

AUX

PHONO

DAB

Internet radio

FM

AM

You can also use the TUNER, CD, iPod, AUX, PHONO and BAND buttons on the remote control unit to select a source.

3 Start playback of the component, or tune in a radio station on this unit.

Please read the instructions of each component.

4 Gradually turn up the volume to the required level by turning the VOLUME/SET knob.

Muting

Press the MUTING button to mute the sound temporarily.

To restore the sound, press the MUTING button again.

Dimmer

Each time you press the DIMMER button, the display changes as follows:

NORMAL (Normal)

DIMMER (Dimmed)

LIGHT OFF (Display off)

This setting is not memorized when the unit turns into standby. The next time the unit is turned on, the display is illuminated as normal.

When the unit is operated during the setting is "LIGHT OFF", the display turns normal briefly and will turn off again.

Adjusting bass, midrange, treble, and balance of speakers

1 Select the item to adjust.

Each time you press the VOLUME/SET knob, the display changes as follows:

VOLUME (volume)

BASS

MID

TREBLE

BALANCE

DIMMER (see the previous page)

BASS

Adjusts the level of low frequency sound range. The level can be adjusted from -12 to +12.

MID

Adjusts the level of middle frequency sound range. The level can be adjusted from -12 to +12.


TRFRI F

Adjusts the level of high frequency sound range. The level can be adjusted from -12 to +12.

BALANCE

Adjusts the balance of the volume level between left and right speakers.

2 Turn the VOLUME/SET knob to change the setting.



3 Leave the unit idle for 3 seconds to exit the setup mode.

Tone Direct

Press the TONE DIRECT button to cancel the tone and balance adjustments temporarily.

When this function gets active, the Tone Direct indicator lights up temporarily.

To cancel the Tone Direct function, press the button again.

When this function is active and no operation is done for about 5 seconds, the display is turned off regardless of the dimmer setting.

Listening to iPod

1 Select iPod by pressing the SOURCE button repeatedly.

Basic operations

To suspend playback temporarily (pause mode)

During playback, press the play/pause button ($\,$ /). Playback stops at the current position.

2 Insert the iPod into the dock.

To resume playback, press the play/pause button (/) again.

To skip to the next or a previous track

During playback, press the search buttons (/) repeatedly until the desired track is found.

The iPod automatically turns on and starts playback from the iPod's music list.

When the iPod is inserted while a source other than iPod is selected, the iPod will turn on and enter the pause mode.

Make sure to use an appropriate dock adapter (see "Getting Started" on the owner's manual of the iPod dock).

The iPod is recharged when it is plugged into the dock and the AG-H600 series receiver is on. While the unit is on standby, the iPod is not recharged because the unit's power consumption is minimised to meet the regulation of IEA.

When headphones are plugged into the iPod, sound comes from both the speakers of the AG-H600 series receiver and the headphones.

When the search button () is pressed during playback, the current track will be played from the beginning. If you want to play the previous tracks, press the search button () twice or more.

To search for a part of a track

During playback, hold down the search button (or) and release it when the part you want to listen to is found.

Menu operations

To go back to the previous menu

Press the MENU button.


This button is equivalent to the MENU button on your iPod.

To select the menu item

Press the scroll buttons ($\fine \fine \$

On the main unit, turn the MULTI JOG/ENTER knob to scroll to the menu item you want, and then press the MULTI JOG/ENTER knob.

Repeat playback



Each time the REPEAT button is pressed, the repeat mode changes as follows:

One (repeat one song)


All (repeat all the songs in the list)

Repeat Off

When you select the "One", the Repeat One icon (appears in the iPod's display.

When you select the "All", the Repeat icon () appears in the iPod's display.

Shuffle playback



Each time the SHUFFLE button is pressed, the shuffle mode changes as follows:

Song (shuffle songs)

Album (shuffle albums)

Shuffle Off

When you select "Song", the iPod shuffles songs within the list you choose to play.


When you select "Album", the iPod plays all the songs on an album in order, and then randomly selects another album in the list and plays through it in order.

During playback, the Shuffle icon (\mathbf{x}) appears in the iPod's display.

DAB Basic operations

Setting up your DAB Tuner

The first time you select DAB as the source, the unit will scan for DAB channels and build a channel list.



1 Press the power switch to turn the unit on.

When the system control functions are activated, always set this switch on, and turn the unit on/standby using the remote control unit.

2 Select DAB by pressing the SOURCE button repeatedly.

You can also use the BAND button on the remote control unit.

The unit will scan for ensembles broadcast in the local area and add them to the channel list as they are found. The scan should take about 20 seconds.

After broadcast services have been found the channels are listed in alphanumeric order.

If no broadcast services are found, please check that the antenna is correctly connected to the unit.

Using the Channel List

1 Select DAB by pressing the SOURCE button repeatedly.

You can also use the BAND button on the remote control unit.

The list of available channels is displayed.

If the channel list is not displayed, turn the MULTI JOG/ENTER knob or press the skip buttons (/) on the remote control unit

2 Scroll through the channels in the channel list.

Turn the MULTI JOG/ENTER knob.

3 When you have found a channel that you want to listen to, press the ENTER button.

The channel is tuned in and channel information is displayed.

Note

To display the channel list while listening to a DAB channel, turn the MULTI JOG/ENTER knob or press / on the remote control unit.

Channels are displayed in alphanumeric order in the channel list, with numbers coming first.


If a channel is no longer broadcasting or the unit is moved out of the area of a broadcast channel, the unit will no longer be able to tune in the channel. If the channel cannot be tuned in, a question mark "?" is displayed in front of the channel name. If you select this channel to tune in by pressing the MULTI JOG/ENTER knob, "No stations Available" is displayed.

You can move a channel that is no longer available to the end of the channel list. See "Station order" on page 19.

Using DAB Menu 1

DAB menu operations

In DAB mode, use DAB menu to access various functions. There are 6 options in the DAB menu.



To open DAB menu

Press the MENU button while DAB is selected as the source.

MENU



To select the menu item

Turn the MULTI JOG/ENTER knob to scroll to the menu item you want, and then press the MULTI JOG/ENTER knob.



On the remote control unit, use the scroll buttons ($\ \ \ \ \ \ \ \ \ \ \)$ to scroll to the menu item you want, and then press the ENTER button.



The signal strength is displayed. This may be useful when adjusting or positioning an antenna for better reception.

DRC value

This option sets the Dynamic Range Control (DRC) value to be applied to received broadcasts. DRC is used to reduce the range between high and low volumes of audio and is sometimes applied at the broadcast source. Pop music may have a high value of DRC applied, appropriate for constantly high listening levels, while classical music broadcasts may have no DRC applied to allow the listener to hear the full dynamic range of the source volume.

1 Open the DAB menu.

Press the MENU button while DAB is selected as the source.



Changing Display Settings

Each time the INFO/RDS button is pressed, the information is displayed as follows.



DLS

The Dynamic Label Segment (DLS) is the scrolling text label supplied by the radio station. It may be information on music titles or details regarding the programme or station.

BBC Radio 5 Live WEEKDAY NEWS & D

Programme type

This is a description of the type of broadcast supplied by the radio station such as Pop, Rock or Classical music.

BBC Radio 5 Live Drama

Ensemble name

This displays the name of the ensemble that is broadcasting the programme.

BBC Radio 5 Live BBC National DAB

Channel and frequency

This displays the channel and frequency of the current playing broadcast.

BBC Radio 5 Live 11C 220.35MHz

Bitrate mode

This displays the bitrate of the current playing broadcast.

This displays the current time and date, which is supplied by the radio station and should always be accurate.

When a station is found, the unit tunes in the station automatically. Repeat this step until the station you want to listen to is found.

Press the TUNING MODE button to stop the auto tuning.

FM Mode

Pressing the FM MODE button alternates between Stereo mode and Mono mode. $\,$

Stereo:

FM stereo broadcasts are received in stereo and the stereo indicator is displayed.

Mono:

Select this mode when the signal is weak. Reception will be forced monaural, reducing unwanted noise.

Preset Tuning

Troubleshooting

If you experience any problems with the unit, please take a moment to look through this chart and see if you can solve the problem yourself before you call your dealer or a TEAC service centre.

Amplifier section

No power.

Check the connection to the AC power source. Check and make sure the AC source is not a switched outlet and if it is, the switch is turned on. Make sure there is power to the AC outlet by plugging another item such as a lamp or a fan.

No sound.

Adjust the volume by turning the VOLUME knob.

Check that the speakers and components are connected securely.

Check the operation of the connected component.

Select the proper source using the SOURCE button.

Sound cuts off when listening to the music or no sound even though power is on.

Speaker impedance is less than prescribed for this unit. Turn the power off and reduce the volume.

Low bass response.

Speaker polarity (+/–) is reversed. Check all speakers for correct polarity.

BASS, MID, TREBLE, BALANCE adjustments do not work.

Press the TONE DIRECT button to cancel the Tone Direct function.

Right and left channels are reversed.

The input connection or the speaker connection may be reversed.

The sound is noisy.

The connection cords may be close to the power cord or the fluorescent light.

Connect the ground lead of the turntable to the SIGNAL GND terminal of this unit.

The sound comes from only one channel.

Check the speaker connection.

Adjust the balance to the centre.

The display is off.

Set the dimmer to "NORMAL" or "DIMMER".

Press the TONE DIRECT button to cancel the Tone Direct function.

Remote control unit

Remote control does not work.

If the batteries are exhausted, change the batteries.

Use the remote control unit within the effective range (5m) and point it toward the remote sensor on the front panel.

Make sure that there are no obstacles between the remote control unit and the main unit.

If a fluorescent light is near the unit, turn it off.

iPod Player

Cannot insert the iPod.

Check if appropriate adapter is inserted to the dock. Remove dust or obstacles from the dock and the iPod.

The iPod does not play.

Remove the iPod from the dock, wait a few seconds, and insert it again.

Software update may solve the problem. Visit the Apple website and download the latest iPod Software.

Cannot operate the iPod on the components.

Select iPod as the source.

Make sure the HOLD switch of the iPod is not set to HOLD.

DAB tuner

No sound.

Ensure that the unit has been able to locate DAB stations.

"NO stations Available" appears on the display.

Check that the DAB antenna is connected (see page 5). Ensure that DAB broadcast covers your area.

Cannot access secondary services.

Not all services are accompanied by secondary services. If a secondary service is available, the secondary indicator (">>") is displayed next to the station name.

Display goes out or displayed "service off air".

This may occur if a broadcaster changes the label of a service or removes the label whilst you are listening to it. The unit will try to retune to this station. If the problem persists, follow the procedure for auto scan on page 18.

A burbling sound is heard on some stations.

DAB system is able to produce quality audio from a low level signal, but when the signal level is too low, a "burbling" sound might be heard. To reduce this, try repositioning your antenna to gain maximum signal strength.

If normal operation cannot be recovered, unplug the power cord from the outlet and plug it again.
